**Growing Spiritually, Scholastically, and Socially** Epsilon Chapter Remains Strong Leader Amidst ISU Changes

The Alumni Board is so proud of the accomplishments of Epsilon Chapter. Their grades were first among IFC chapters in fall 2017 with a 3.29 GPA and second in spring 2018 with a 3.32 GPA. On top of that, they achieved excellent recruitment results this year, moving 18 new members into the Chapter. The men continued their solid track record of achieving awards as well.

### Members Earn Edwards Award and ISU President's Cup

This spring, Epsilon earned the Edwards Award, Beta Sigma Psi's award for Chapter Management, and the ISU President's Cup, the highest award given to any chapter in the Greek community at Iowa State. There are also several individual leaders in the Chapter. Epsilon men hold positions on the IFC board; one member received the 2018 Wallace E. Barron All-University Senior Award given to only seven undergraduates per year; and members are involved in various ISU organizations. Just as importantly, we can trust our members to make good decisions.

### Epsilon Chapter Remains a Leader with Risk Management Program

Since the fall of 2017, four fraternities were suspended from ISU Greek events or left campus. Nationally, seven Greek members died in the past year because of hazing. However, our undergraduates are continually working to remove any semblance of such from their ceremonies and activities. As our national organization of Beta Sigma Psi discusses the direction of

the national Fraternity, Epsilon Chapter serves as the model organization.

#### Your Contribution Makes a Difference

In other news, the following Chapter House improvements have been completed or are underway:

- A new roof installed in October 2018.
- New ADA doors on the back of the Chapter House
- Second-floor bathroom remodel.
- New window hardware to improve energy efficiency.

Furthermore, thanks to the generosity of alumni such as yourself, we awarded the following to our worthy undergraduate brothers:

- \$1,400 in scholarships to all Dean's List recipients in the fall, with intentions to repeat for the spring.
- Three Darryl Jahn Scholarships in the amount of \$1,500 each to incoming Lutheran freshmen men to ISU.
- The \$2,000 Lynn Anderson Scholarship was awarded to **Reed Burress** '14 for his leadership.
- \$2,000 in leadership awards to other Beta Sigs with the Junior and Senior Leadership Scholarships.

These improvements and awards are critical to being able to thank our undergraduates for their continued effort and to attract the best new members to the Fraternity.

### How the New Iowa State Ruling Affects Greek Housing

Our support of the undergraduates is ever-critical following the disappointing decisions that Iowa State University has made in the last year concerning the Greek community. For years, fraternities have had a symbiotic relationship with the residence halls and were permitted to recruit men into the Chapter over the course of the summer, which helped alleviate the overpopulation of the dorms.

When I recruited in the summer of 2001, we could sign new members to move into the Fraternity house with minimal deposit penalty up until they moved into the dorms. Yet, within the last five years, that deadline has shifted from August 1 to May 1.

This coming year, the Department of Residence will penalize any freshman member who decides to join a fraternity after May 1, 2019, with a bill for 50% of rooming charges and 80% of their remaining food bill for the entire academic year. This means that a new in-house member who signs after May 1, 2019, will owe a penalty of \$5,750 or more to Iowa State residence halls even though the member may never live in the dorms.

#### What Does This Mean for Epsilon Chapter?

During years of peak growth in student population, the University over-built dormitories and over-bought apartment complexes. There is now an abundance of dorms and contracted University housing available and an overpopulation of apartment buildings in Ames. For the first time in years, enrollment at Iowa State dropped. The residence halls are trying to preserve their income by preventing fraternities from pulling new members into chapter houses.

The new May 1 deadline makes it extremely difficult for us to recruit an in-house freshman class of 18 new members and fails to recognize that high school seniors have yet to graduate and thus are not thinking about visiting Beta Sigma Psi or finalizing their decision to join. We have determined that it would be financially irresponsible for us to move 18 new members into the Chapter at a \$5,700 discount (doing so would equate to a \$102,000 annual loss of income, roughly 25% of the combined annual income for the active and alumni Chapters).

As a unified group, the active members and alumni are hard at work on countermeasures to this unfortunate policy change and its consequences. Those efforts are focused on moving the recruitment process earlier into the year and getting more people involved to lighten the load. We intend to offer \$500 discounts to freshmen who sign with Beta Sigma Psi before May 1, 2019, as well as a \$500 incentive to actives who recruit new members who sign with us before May 1, 2019. (Under this plan, the maximum outlay of discounts would be \$18,000). In order for this plan to work, we need to reach young Lutheran and Christian men who would make great Beta Sigs. Additionally, we are working on strengthening the on-campus recruitment and out-of-house programs to build a bullpen of oncampus members who will be ready to move into the Chapter House their sophomore year.

### How You Can Help

#1: If you know of any Iowa State-bound high school senior Lutheran or Christian men that you feel would be a good fit, please reach out to us so we can contact them now.

#2: Contact your pastors or youth groups to talk about our Fraternity. You can email me or the recruitment chairmen and we can help equip you with brochures and talking points.

#3: This year, consider routing your unassigned ISU Foundation donations to help build our Endowed Scholarship Fund levels higher. That account is #2701227. As is, the fund will yield \$2,000 every year in scholarship money. It would be amazing for us to grow the endowed account more than twice its original amount. Our goal is to ensure that every dollar of the earned interest is awarded to our in-house members as reward for their scholastic and leadership achievements.

For three and a half years, Donald Beermann '68 has worked tirelessly to improve the animal science department at Iowa State University by not only making significant changes in research and teaching instrumentation and equipment, but also to the department's overall environment. "The award

The Chapter has been busy volunteering, learning, and competing in intramurals. So far this semester, Chapter members have volunteered with Gideon, Memorial Lutheran Church, Habitat for Humanity, and a Highway 30 cleanup.
